We feel very strongly that achieving in PE is very important.

We expect all children to wear the school PE kit and therefore we subsidise this for some of our families.

Our PE Curriculum:

A wide range of PE is delivered, aiming to include, engage and inspire all pupils. We believe in embedding positive experiences of PE, PA and Sport (PESSPA), through providing opportunities to take part, play and compete in a range of activities, providing pupils with the ability and sufficient understanding to lead prolonged active and healthy lifestyles. We are fully committed to ensuring that all pupils receive high-quality, well-planned PE each week, delivered by a PE specialist and supported by confident and well-trained staff, we are on our way to achieving the goal of two hours each week through a variety of strategies. We have an up-to-date PE Scheme of work to reflect the requirements of the National Curriculum.

Sustainability:

We aim to use this money to create a sustainable model of PE, Sport and Physical Activity for all children. Some of the money provided by the funding will be invested in the professional development of staff and as a result will enhance the quality of teaching for all children. We invite different specialists into our school, who coach teachers and work alongside them in a range of sports. Due to their influence and expertise, all teachers will have the chance to develop their teaching of PE and will team teach with a specialist to increase knowledge, confidence and competence .

Partnership Work / Competitions: Our school attends a plethora of sporting events and activities across the Liverpool area. We have multiple club links with local clubs and sport providers to ensure we provide opportunities for our pupils to experience different sports and avenues of physical activity, both in and outside of school time.

As well as our regular PE lessons, we provide a range of sport and PA based competitions and activities, in the form of 'PE value star of the week', after school enrichment clubs to enhance interest and engagement in sport, positive playtimes and PA across the school. We also provide annual sports-days for EYFS, KS1 and KS2.

Participation: The school is keen to provide a wide range of extra-curricular opportunities for pupils. We have a number of sports teams that compete in local competitions against other schools, including Girls and Boys football, athletics, swimming, cricket, dodgeball, tag rugby and basketball. Other after school clubs include KS1 & KS2 multisports, football, netball, gymnastics, dance, tennis, box fit, forest school and breakfast/after school clubs that include participation in PA. More Able: Talented children are signposted to local clubs e.g. athletics, football, cricket, basketball, swimming, gymnastics, hockey, golf and tennis. We also host and attend 'aspire' competitions aimed at engaging SEND pupils with sports and PA.

The aims of our spending are to:

1. increasing all staff's confidence, knowledge and skills in teaching PE and sport
2. increasing engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity and sport
3. raising the profile of PE and sport across the school, to support whole school improvement
4. offer a broader and more equal experience of a range of sports and physical activities to all pupils
5. increase participation in competitive sport (school teams/inter school and intra school competitions/ extra-curricular clubs/local club links)

They teach the water safety aspect. We have also had the RNLI in to school to lead a whole school assembly and workshops to teach pupils about water safety on local beaches.
